

# **PASTORAL SHARINGS**

Dear Parishioners,

The story of the appearance of the risen Lord on the way to Emmaus is the best developed of all the appearance stories. The drama evolves around the tension of whether or not the disciples will recognize the risen Lord in their very midst.

In the catechesis I offer on the occasion of celebrating the sacrament of Baptism, I always use the Emmaus story. Those of us who were educated in our religion by means of the Baltimore Catechism remember the definition of a sacrament. It comes so easily to our minds. "A sacrament is an outward sign instituted by Christ to give grace." And indeed, each element of this definition holds true today. Each sacrament has an outward sign, they were instituted by Christ and each sacrament gives its own sacramental grace, the supernatural help God gives us to perform the duties asked of us who have received the particular sacrament. But the theologians of Vatican II saw the sacrament more as an encounter with the Risen Lord, and so the Emmaus story fits right into that understanding of a sacrament.

The two disciples leaving Jerusalem and heading for the little town of Emmaus some few miles distant are discouraged by the crucifixion of their friend Jesus. All their hopes and dreams for the future were dashed by the events of Good Friday. As they walked along discussing what had happened, Jesus, under the appearance of the risen Lord approaches them. The scriptures tell us that the disciples did not recognize Jesus, and Jesus makes the first move by asking the two disciples what they were talking about as they walked along.

Then a lengthy conversation occurs between the risen Lord and the disciples. The disciples are shocked that this stranger did not know what had happened to Jesus the Nazarene. Surely there were so many witnesses to the sorrowful way and the crucifixion and death of Jesus that everyone must have heard what happened. Their relating of the events is an affirmation that Jesus is a prophet and their description serves as a summary outline of the Gospel narrative from Jesus' arrest to his death, burial and reports of the empty tomb by some women. The irony of all this is that the subject of their conversation is walking alongside them and then Jesus points out that everything that happened was part of God's plan. He does this by interpreting the scriptures for them, and still they did not recognize him.

St. Luke then tells us that in their hunger the disciples offered Jesus hospitality. They stopped by the side of the road and Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke the bread and gave it to them. It was at this point in the breaking of the bread that the disciples immediately recognized Jesus, but he then quickly vanished from them. They returned to Jerusalem to spread the news. As a result, for early Christians the story of the road to Emmaus said to them that we can still meet the risen Lord in the presence of the stranger. It helped them understand the interpretation of the scriptures and that they could meet the risen Lord in the breaking of the bread.


